## Member Spotlight: Beth Parker



When you look up the definition of welcome in the dictionary it is likely that you will find Beth Parker's name. Beth has lived in Blacksburg, VA for six years and immediately became a vital member of the Blacksburg Newcomers' Club. She has held numerous positions; leader of the walking interest group, newsletter coordinator, past president and is currently leading our Gadabouts interest group. Beth was one of the first people that welcomed me warmly to the area and when you move often finding a welcoming embrace is an important part of learning to love where you live.

Beth believes that "giving of oneself is a key part of being a global citizen. You need people to help you. Most people don't have family nearby. Who do you call when you are in need?" For Beth the answer is —"the community you build."

This belief comes from firsthand experience. Beth grew up in a traditional middle-class family in Brooklyn, New York. Her father was a special education teacher and a founding member of a service organization called the Brownsville Boys Club, still open today and her mother served the community by caring for 23 foster children and and rocking infants at the hospital. Beth's father died when she was a year old and her mom remarried. Her stepfather was an old-fashioned medical doctor who often traded services/products for care.

Service, family and community development served as anchor points in their household. While Beth grew up living in one place, seeing cousins

and grandparents often, Beth's adult life has been one of many moves—starts and stops, beginnings and endings causing her to redefine what family life and community looks like.

Over the last twenty-eight years of her marriage to Robert Parker, Beth has lived in California, Ohio, China, Australia, Denmark, Italy, and currently resides Blacksburg, Virginia. She has learned that finding purpose has required her to be flexible, to engage, and work assiduously in building community.

As Robert's career as a mechanical engineering professor advanced, Beth has worked in many roles depending on their family's location. Starting out as a special ed teacher and moving into business as a receptionist, she continued on to working on the sales floor at Macys. Payroll at the Gap for a few years and working up to becoming the Senior Director of North American Payroll for DHL. After moving to China, she gained certification in ESL and recently restarted trying to complete her master's (originally begun in psychology) in project Management. She describes herself as a "jack of all trades," but it is more evident that she knows how to "show up, immediately start making connections, learn the ropes and get excited about a new start. She has also been an active contributor serving communities wherever she lived.

Beth relishes the various experiences that have created the mosaic of her life and most importantly Beth's life has illustrated that "you can live anywhere and be happy." Being excited about each new start was key not only for Beth but was valuable for anchoring her entire family. Beth's ability to adapt taught her children the importance of reaching for new opportunities but also tackling the challenges of leaving a well cultivated life behind to begin anew.

Moving as the trailing partner and not having a defined career required Beth to be very thoughtful about how she wants to engage the world. Beth enjoys "connecting people and connecting people to things." She initiates an idea and moves to the background to help it grow and thrive. In Blacksburg, Beth along with Sarak Black and Alexa Casey founded 100+ Women Who Care NRV, an organization that supports non-profits that have a direct impact on the local community by

donating \$15,000 per quarter to a local charity.

The beauty of community elevates one beyond the individual and weaves the richness of multiple offerings for the benefit of others. Beth has shared her unique gifts with each community she has lived in but also has deeply benefited from the riches of kind gestures she has received from the numerous people that have helped her adapt to new environments and circumstances.

Ron and Beth are about to begin a new phase of life as an empty nesters. Her oldest son Jason is a graduate student at Berkeley, her daughter Sarah is a sophomore at Mary Washington University and her youngest, Brian will be graduating from high school and heading to college. This gives Beth an opportunity to reassess, recreate herself and begin to think again about how she wants to engage in the world now that her children are older and who she wants to be.
